Arithmetic:

According to the Riding Academy manager, Carol Olson-Smith, the number of students who participated increased in both "Mar.-Aug." and "fiscal year" totals. For Mar.-Aug in 2024 there had been 572 students, and this year there've been 699.

Yearly, for 2024, the RA trained 873 students, and as of today, for 2025, 919 students. With added days of class offerings, as well as opportunities for DC HOG members to have exclusive courses, the increase is steady.

Carol and other instructors say that the HOG chapter is very supportive, often referring friends and family.
